General Note

This table is a fill-in. The following is a basic guide for entering information:

- + Spell everything out (don't use numbers)
- + If a highway has a local street name, use the local street name.
- + Numbered streets and highways:
- One-digit street numbers: third
- One digit highway numbers: two
- Two-digit numbers: forty-six(th)
- Three-digit numbers: three sixty-four(th),
- Three-digit highways with middle zero: highway nine-oh-four
- + Ramp terminal (leg) example:
- highway three ninety-five southbound ramp
- + Use phonetic spelling for hard to pronounce names.
- Ex: Tyee (tie-ee); Trosper (traw-spur)
- + Use L or R for arrow direction
- + Add rows for additional units

Example 1

- + Intersection of 4th Ave and Center St
- + Fourth Ave runs North-South
- + Center St runs East-West
- + Crosswalks on north, east, and west legs

Example 2

- + Intersection of Highway 911 and Puyallup Ave.
- + Crossings on all four legs

Example 3

- + Intersection of Highway 1 and Meridian St
- + Highway One runs east-west
- + Meridian St runs north-south
- + Crossings on north, south, and east legs

Example 4

- + Intersection of 23rd Ave and 111th St
- + Crossings on all four legs
- + Include the street type (street, avenue, drive, etc.) when both streets have the same name (e.g. Center St and Center Dr); This may also be used when both streets are numbers, to aid in location and orientation.

General Note

Note: blank rows may be used to break table up, but are not required.

Example 5

- + Eastbound I-104 ramp terminal at 256th St
- + Only one crossing of 256th St
- + Include direction (NB, SB, EB, WB) and word "ramp" to:
- Differentiate between ramp terminals (NB vs. SB)
- Avoid the perception that the crossing is across the mainline highway – particularly important for Interstates.
